Wednesday, November 20 - Lester Lefkowitz Close-Up and Macro Photography in the Great Outdoors



There's an entire universe of beauty, fascination and intrigue on a scale not readily captured in conventional photography. This presentation will show you the basics of how to get close, and closer, to the wonderful details and never-ending curiosities you can find in the natural world.

Lester will cover the concepts of magnification ranges, various optical and mechanical methods for getting close (diopter lenses, extension tubes, macro lenses), issues of critical focus and depth-of-field, techniques for camera support and vibration control, and lighting. You'll see a demonstration of focus stacking to achieve "infinite" depth-of-field. Esthetics are just as important; he'll touch on composition, background, appropriate light, image balance and subject selection.

Lester Lefkowitz has been a lifelong photographer. His work has appeared in National Geographic, The New York Times, Time Magazine, and hundreds of other U.S. and international publications. Lester has created images for Microsoft, General Electric, IBM, General Motors, Citibank, Johnson & Johnson and many other Fortune500® companies. He's photographed in all fifty states, twenty-one countries and Antarctica. He is also the author of three books on photography, including *The Manual of Close-Up Photography*. In March of 2021 he will be teaching a workshop in Chile.

In Memoriam - Miriam Balmuth

It is with great sadness we observe the passing of long-time SierraPhotoNYC member Miriam Balmuth on September 27th following a stroke.

Miriam was active with our group since the late 1980s and had twice served on our Board. She rarely missed a meeting. As Nancy Langer said: "She was our number one fan!" Miriam loved coming to our meetings, outings, exhibits and events. She made many friends through the years. "I remember Miriam as always smiling and so full of energy," Pat Garbarini wrote. "She was loyal to us to the end... She kept coming to our meetings, year after year."

Miriam was born in Brownsville, Brooklyn and grew up with her three sisters in East New York. She was a proud alumna of the New York City public school system where she thrived academically. She went on to earn her doctorate at New York University, becoming a highly respected expert in psychology and education. She specialized in developmental and remedial reading as a professor at Hunter College (CUNY) where she helped develop and then headed the M.S. program in Teacher Education. She was the author of many books and articles, including her most important work:

The Roots of Phonics.

When not teaching, she traveled the world. She was a member of Travelers' Century Club (TCC), an organization for people who have visited 100 or more of the world's countries and territories. The photographic fruits of her travels allowed her to give many travel slide shows at Tuesday Evening Hour, a travel photography group. Her activity there lead to her becoming a long time board member. She was also a staunch member of her teachers' union and her Democratic Club.

An active hiker, she went on countless outings sponsored by the Appalachian Mountain Club (AMC). She loved to talk with the people she met and had the ability to draw out amazing details about their lives. She always looked for common ground and enjoyed the community of groups.

I am personally indebted to her for introducing me to what was at the time called the Sierra Club Photography Committee. We first met in 1991 when I sat next to her on a bus to Bear Mountain. She was on her way to an AMC hike while I was on my way to my own hike on Dunderberg Mountain. During our wide-ranging conversation, she told me about the Photography Committee. It took me a year to get to my first meeting, but I am so glad I did! If I hadn't joined the Photography Committee, I wouldn't have met my wife Linda and all of the other wonderful people whom Miriam loved. Miriam always said she was proud she made the connection.

Miriam is survived by her older sister, Regina, and 11 nieces and nephews. No memorial service has been planned as of this time. She was buried at Hebron Cemetery in Queens, New York. Condolences can be sent to her niece Baysa and Baysa's husband Zei Belsky at 1381 East 29 Street, Brooklyn, NY, 11210, who will share them with the rest of Miriam's family.


